Marylia Kelley is Executive Director at **Tri-Valley CAREs** (Communities Against a Radioactive Environment), a "watchdog" organization that monitors activities at the Livermore nuclear weapons lab. Tri-Valley CAREs strengthens global security by preventing the further development of nuclear weapons and working tirelessly for their elimination.
